Annual Plan scorecard - how'd we do?

We started the year with three main goals:

- 1. Strategic Goal 1: Empowering Every Learner to Embrace Opportunities
- 2. Strategic Goal 2: Enhancing the capability of our teachers to innovate so every child can be successful
- 3. Strategic Goal 3: Building Connectedness across the school.

These three strategic goals equate to 9 initiatives and 16 action plans that deliver clarity for staff, enable management to steer direction, and governance (BOT) to track the progress, growth and success against these goals.

We've seen curriculum developed, communities engaged, the implementation of the Mitey Programme (supporting better mental health outcomes), high participation and collaboration across Kahui Ako (our community of learning), investment in professional learning and development across reading and writing (phonics) and the formalisation of our relationship with Te Kawerau O Maki to help build connectedness with heritage and community.

Frankly, it's impressive stuff. As a board we'd love to claim the success - but the truth is, our success is about school culture. We display PRIDE in all that we do, and that builds success.

Ultimately we're measured on results. And given the coalition government's renewed focus on literacy and numeracy, the board were pleased to review the end of year results in reading, writing and maths. Results see year on year improvement across all three measures and above the national averages.

These results reflect the passion, dedication and commitment of the staff. An impressive achievement and growth all round, hats off team.

We're seeing lots of growth and development across the board. How about you? It's not really our scorecard to rate, we'd love feedback and feedforward to keep building a school and community that
